

## Preserve

- We continue to preserve the dignity of older adults and people with disabilities through home care services, so that they can live safely in their homes and communities. In 2017, we provided 429,428 hours of home care to # of individuals.
- LSS Caregivers are treasured for their empathy, compassion, and patience. Their work is greatly undervalued in the contracts that provide these services, so we continue to work toward a just and equitable wage, which is only possible through your generous support.



"I love to talk to older adults and take care of them. I think that one day, I will need help too," says Rosie (right), who has been an LSS-SW caregiver for over 11 years, with clients Rafael and Rosa.



"If it wasn't for you, I wouldn't be here. It's scary on the streets. Especially for an older and disabled person like me," says Ramona, of her time in I-HELP.

## Build

- In response to dramatic reductions in the number of refugees that enter the United States, LSS-SW built awareness for refugee resettlement with press conferences, letter writing campaigns, and advocacy alerts to advocate for refugee resettlement. We built foundations for 1,382 newly arrived refugees, with x% gaining self-sufficiency within # of months of arrival.
- The Arizona Department of Child Services named LSS-SW a Regional Child Abuse Prevention Council to build awareness of child abuse and neglect, and most of all, what the community can do to assist in prevention.
- LSS-SW Family Resource centers built resiliency and strength for over 10,000 families, including 368 learning and socialization opportunities.


## Stabilize

- The Interfaith Homeless Emergency Lodging Program (I-HELP) is a low-barrier shelter that brings safety to edges of the valley where other shelter services are limited. I-HELP stabilizes the lives of people in homelessness through safe shelter, case management, and the compassion of faith communities. In 2017, we expanded I-HELP to the Southwest Valley (including Avondale and Goodyear) to shelter 12 people each night. In total, # people accessed I-HELP for a total of 8,819 shelter bed nights.
- As a heritage of our service to Arizona's most vulnerable, we distributed 9,172 food boxes to those in hunger. 463 households also accessed emergency services of rent & utility assistance.
- Foster care has continued to expand, placing 98 children and adults with disabilities in 60 safe and loving foster homes.

  17 children were adopted into forever families during our first full year of providing adoption services.


